

The Thursday MURDER Club



Elizabeth, Joyce, Ibrahim and Ron might be pushing 80 but they still have a few tricks up their sleeves.


Can our unorthodox but brilliant gang catch the killer before it's too late?



Recipe:

I'd like to share some easy to follow and lovely to eat recipes from family, friends, colleagues and some that I've come across.

This one is off the internet

ROSEMARY CHICKEN with OVEN ROASTED RATATOUILLE



Prep time: 15 minutes **Cook:** 40 minutes **Serves:** 4 **Easy**

[Type here]

INGREDIENTS

- 1 aubergine, cut into chunky pieces
- 2 courgettes, sliced into half moons
- 2 large garlic cloves, crushed
- 3 mixed peppers, deseeded and roughly chopped
- 2tsp finely chopped rosemary, plus 4 small sprigs
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 4 skinless boneless chicken breast

Little tip

Herbs

If you don't have fresh rosemary, use fresh thyme or a couple of pinches of dried rosemary. Dried herbs have a more intense flavour, so use less.

Seasoning

Salt and pepper

METHOD

STEP 1

- Heat the oven to 200c/180c fan/gas 6.
- In a large roasting tin, toss together the aubergine, courgettes and peppers with half the chopped rosemary, half the garlic, 2 tbsp oil and some seasoning.
- Spread out the vegetables in an even layer, then roast in the oven for 20 minutes

STEP 2

- Meanwhile, mix remaining rosemary, garlic and oil together.
- Slash each of the chicken breasts 4-5 times with a sharp knife, brush over the oil, season and chill for 15 minutes.

STEP 3

- After vegetables have cooked for 20 minutes, stir in the tomatoes.
- Make spaces in the roasting tin and nestle the chicken breasts amongst the vegetables.
- Place a rosemary sprig on top of each chicken breast.
- Return the tin to the oven for 18-20 minutes, until the chicken is cooked through and the vegetables are lightly caramelised.
- Serve with new potatoes - Optional

CRAFT TIME

How to make Handprint Flowers



You will need

- Coloured card
- Wooden dowels/thick straws
- Wool/yarn to match flowers
- Glue stick
- Sticker jewels
- Jar
- Scissors

How to:

1. Choose colour card you would like your flowers to be, fold into 4 squares and trace child's hand
2. Cut out the handprints, you should have 4 of the same size



3. Glue together using the glue stick to form the flower
4. Glue or add sticky jewels to the centre of the flowers

5. Tape the wooden dowel/thick straw to the back of the handprint flower



6. Now make the leaves, using green card. Draw a leaf and cut it out
7. Add glue to the end of the leaf
8. Wrap around the wooden dowel/thick straw

9. Wrap wool/yarn around the top of the jar (you could put glue around before you add the wool/yarn if you would like to keep it on permanently) tuck the end piece of your wool/yarn under(to secure) when you have the required look
10. Place handprint flower in your jar vase and Enjoy





By Katherine Rundell





SAVING WINSLOW



This brilliant series combines learning science with seasonal craft projects, scientific experiments and fun activities.


In Winter why not create some ice balloons, investigate crystals or design your own bottle bird feeder, plus many more fascinating ideas to try out.
